

Bird City Bastrop



Bastrop was one of the first cities in Texas to be named a Bird City!

Bird City Texas recognizes cities that promote birdfriendly habitat, including good water management, preserving green spaces, knowing the value of native plants in the habitat, and making buildings safe for birds. This includes turning off unnecessary bright lighting at night while birds are migrating and keeping cats inside.

There are many birds that call Bastrop home, and many more that migrate through on their way to breeding territories and wintering grounds; over 277 species have been reported here! This includes bald eagles, hummingbirds, cardinals, shorebirds, and painted buntings.

Bastrop has at least 6 species of woodpeckers and 4 species of owls!

Pine Cone Bird Feeder Adventure!

Help your feathered friends and have fun doing it!

Birds need food, especially in the winter and early spring when natural snacks can be hard to find. You can help by making your very own pine cone bird feeder! This simple project uses things you can find in nature and around the house—and it's a blast to make.

What You'll Need:

- 1 large pine cone (open and dry)
- String or yarn
- Peanut butter or sunbutter (for nut-free friends)
- Birdseed
- · Butter knife or spoon
- Plate or shallow bowl
- Paper towel (for easy cleanup)
- Grown-up helper

Let's Get Started!

Step 1:

Tie the string around the top of your pine cone, leaving enough length to hang it from a tree branch later.

Step 2:

Use a butter knife or spoon to spread peanut butter all over the pine cone. Get into the little spaces—birds love when the treat is packed in tight!

Step 3:

Pour birdseed onto your plate or into a shallow bowl. Roll the sticky pine cone in the seed until it's nice and coated.

Step 4:

Pick a good spot outside to hang your feeder. Look for a tree branch that's easy to see from a window so you can birdwatch from indoors. Hang it about five feet off the ground.

Step 5:

Watch and enjoy! See who comes to visit—sparrows, finches, maybe even a woodpecker!

Ranger Tip:

Want to be a bird detective? Keep a notebook and draw pictures of the birds you see. Can you spot more than five different kinds?

Water Conservation

Where Does Our Water Come From?

In Bastrop, we get our water from deep underground! The city has seven special wells that bring up clean water from below the surface. After that, the water gets cleaned and treated to make sure it's safe to drink. Then it's sent to homes, schools, and businesses through big pipes.



Why Is Water So Important?

Every living thing needs water to survive—people, animals, plants, even tiny bugs! We use water to drink, cook, wash, take showers, and flush toilets. Farmers use water to grow fruits and vegetables, and animals need it to stay healthy too.

Earth has lots and lots of water, but most of it is in the ocean—and it's way too salty to drink. That means we have to protect the clean water we do have so there's enough for everyone!

How Can You Help Save Water?

Good news—you can be a water-saving hero! Here are a few easy ways:

- Turn off the faucet while brushing your teeth.
- Take shorter showers.
- Help your grown-ups find and fix leaky faucets.
- Don't play with the hose or sprinkler just for fun.

Hi kids! It's Lolly again and I want to tell you about something very important: **reduce, reuse, and recycle!** These three words help us take care of our environment.



- Butterfly or pollinator gardens


- · A fun and safe playground

Park Helpers

Friends like the Texas Audubon Society (tx.audubon.org) put up bird houses and share cool facts to make the park a happy home for birds. Texas Master Gardener (txmg. org/bastropcounty/) and Texas Master Naturalist (txmn.org/lostpines/) volunteers help by planting gardens with native plants, building bird blinds where we can watch birds up close, and making trails for everyone to explore. These special areas bring in wildlife and make our parks beautiful places to visit and enjoy.
