





Award-Winning Books

Every year, at the annual American Library Association Midwinter Conference, books, authors, and illustrators receive accolades and awards. The three most prestigious awards are the John Newbery Medal for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature, the Randolph Caldecott Medal for the most distinguished American picture book for children, and the Michael L. Printz Award for excellence in literature written for young adults. All three of these titles, which you can see in the images above, will soon be available for check-out at the Bastrop Public Library.

However, awards that promote diverse reading experiences are also given. These include the Asian/Pacific American Award for Literature promotes Asian/Pacific American culture and heritage and is awarded based on literary and artistic merit; the Pura Belpré Awards honoring Latino writers and illustrators whose children's books best portray, affirm, and celebrate the Latino cultural experience; Coretta Scott King Book Awards recognizing African American authors and illustrators of outstanding books for children and young adults; the Coretta Scott King/John Steptoe New Talent Award to affirm new talent; the Schneider Family Book Award for books that embody an artistic expression of the disability experience; the Stonewall Book Award for children's and YA books of exceptional merit relating to the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender experience; and more. 






## February Is Black History Month

# Mental Health Workshop for Librarians

On Thursday, January 17, 2019, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, in conjunction with Bluebonnet Trails and Integral Care of Travis County, presented a Mental Health First Aid workshop to area librarians.

Thirty-five librarians met to learn about the manifestations of various mental health illnesses in adults. Working with the public on a daily basis, librarians often come into contact with a wide variety of people, some of whom may seem to act outside the social norms. As explained in the workshop, many times, these people are not dangerous, but often do need to be approached with care and without stigma.
