### **Plan for disposition of TCEQ violation**

On or about May 23, 2022, the City received a Proposed Agreed Order from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in relation to alleged wastewater permit discharge violations. The City's Public Works staff, in coordination with the City Attorney's office, submitted a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) proposal (attached) to TCEQ on June 21, 2022. If the SEP is approved, it would allow the City to allocate funds which would directly benefit the City, in lieu of paying fines to the State. Attached is the Final Bastrop Compliance SEP Application and Enclosures.

### **Stakeholder Meeting Monday**

The quarterly stakeholders meeting was held on Monday, June 20, 2022 at Film Alley. The meetings provide an opportunity to engage in community-wide conversations and network on how to collaborate and support events in Bastrop. Heidi Little, the Corporate and Community Events Manager for Schulman

Theatres, talked about utilizing Film Alley’s event spaces and partnership opportunities. Linda Quiroz with Bastrop County Cares walked through the Cares website, encouraging attendees to utilize it for any volunteer needs. Special Events Manager Kathy Danielson provided information on how to get special event insurance locally, and Community Impact Manager Candice Butts spoke about the monthly community engagement series and newsletter. The group discussed upcoming events and partnership opportunities. Pizza and bowling were provided to promote engagement.

The fun kicks off at 8:00 am with the 1K Fun Run, RUN, White and Blue 5K, and many other fun contests during the day - plus a patriotic surprise or two! The Convention Center will be used for off-site parking with shuttles running to the event.

### **Library News**

Week four of the summer reading program, Oceans of Possibilities brought 129 children and parents to LEGO Rama for creative LEGO fun. Carmen Serna hosted over 100 folks at preschool Storytime, and our Patriotic Shoebox Parade entries started rolling in for display next week. Statistics for the week: 726 registrations for reading, 231 Reached the 500-minute reading goal, 542 registrations for the Community Adventure, 2,158 books and other materials checked out, and 1,588 people walked through the doors.

In your May 23, 2022 letter that enclosed a Proposed Agreed Order, Docket No. 2021-1490-MWD-E, TCEQ has alleged the East Bastrop Wastewater Treatment Facility ("Facility"), March 10, 2020 TPDES Permit Number WQ0011076001 ("Permit"), has violated certain effluent limitations set forth in the Facility's Permit during the monitoring periods of April, May and June, 2021.

Mr. John Dugdale, Assistant City Attorney, has had numerous conversations with Ms. Harley Hobson, Enforcement Coordinator, of your staff. Those discussions related to the City of Bastrop's ("City's") potential acceptance of the Proposed Agreed Order ("Order") and commitment to perform a Supplemental Environmental Project ("SEP").

The Order requires the payment of an administrative penalty in the amount of \$106,250. However, in your May 23, 2022 letter, you offer the City the opportunity to perform a Respondent Compliance SEP under which the City would incur expenses at a minimum equal to the proposed penalty amount. The City has concluded that it qualifies to apply for a Respondent Compliance SEP: 1) It has not previously committed the same alleged violations with the same underlying causes at the Facility within the past five years; and 2), it has not entered into an agreement with a government agency to perform a project or projects the City will propose.

The City has identified two appropriate candidate SEP projects: The first relates to upgrades to the East Bastrop Wastewater Treatment Facility ("Facility"), and the second relates to the replacement of structurally unstable manholes within the City's wastewater collection system. The City understands that by proposing two potential Compliance SEP projects, it is not committing to perform both. See enclosure A, Respondent Compliance SEP Application and an attached page that sets out responses that do not fit within the confines of the application form.

Pursuant to the Publicly Owned Treatment Works ("POTW") upgrade proposal, the City will incur approximately at least \$119,000, and pursuant to the manhole replacement project it will incur at least \$150,000 in contractor costs. Therefore, the POTW upgrade SEP costs are approximately \$13,000 more than the proposed penalty amount, and the manhole replacement SEP costs exceed the proposed penalty amount by approximately \$44,000.

Please note that the City recently initiated the bidding process for the POTW upgrade proposal and has received three bid quotes for equipment and some labor, although City employees will perform most of the labor associated with this project. Those bid quotes collectively comprise Enclosure B. All three purchases subject to the bids are for the replacement of equipment necessary to prevent potentially disastrous upsets and bypasses of untreated effluent into the Colorado River.

Plan B, the removal and replacement of structurally-unstable manholes in order to eliminate potential inflow, infiltration and exfiltration issues, will require the City to perform extensive pre-bid investigations of the entire wastewater collection system. Only when the City has completed that investigation may it solicit bids and select a/the qualified contractor(s) and may it determine if allocated funds will be sufficient. However, the underlying problem does not pose an imminent threat that must be addressed immediately, as is the case with Plan A. For those reasons, the City has not been able to scope the project before it can engage in the bidding process.

Stated simply, Plan B, although meritorious, is not practicable at this time: The project will not address the imminent threats Plan A addresses. Furthermore, the performance of the pre-bid investigations will be so lengthy that it could not possibly meet any of the current time constraints the Draft Proposed Order sets out.

The following provides outlines of the work and costs associated with the two different SEP proposals.

#### Plan A: POTW Upgrades: \$119,183.97

Plan A essentially consists of 3 equipment/parts purchases which are centered around operational capabilities of the wastewater system:

1. East Wastewater Treatment Facility ("WWTF") Blower: \$58,340.26- The existing Wastewater Treatment Facility consists of 2 separate wastewater treatment units. The larger of the 2 units was designed and built with only 2 blowers used for aeration/treatment processes. Due to catastrophic mechanical failure, only one blower is currently in operation for that treatment unit. The purchase of a second blower would prevent the discharge of untreated wastewater into the Colorado River, should the only existing blower fail.
2. Bypass pump repair: \$15,396.29- The City owns an aged sewer bypass pump which is currently inoperable due to extensive wear on the "wet end" of the pump. That currently-inoperable pump had been used in the event of mechanical or electrical failures at wastewater lift stations, as well as when needed to perform bypass pumping required for sewer main repairs/replacements. The purchase and installation of the required parts would place the bypass pump back into full service and would help to eliminate unnecessary sanitary sewer overflows or discharges.
3. Bypass pump purchase: \$45,447.42- The purchase of a second wastewater bypass pump to ensure continuity of operations during mechanical/electrical failures. The City currently owns and operates a total of 20 different wastewater lift stations. Of those lift station sites, only 5 have on-site backup generation capabilities.

Finally, we believe that the City can complete the work required for Plan A within 130 days following the effective date of the Agreed Order.

#### Plan B: Manhole Replacements: \$150,000

Plan B consists of the “turnkey” replacement by qualified contractors of structurally-unstable manholes within the wastewater collection system. To date, the City has identified nine manholes that require replacement to eliminate inflow, infiltration, and exfiltration issues. However, the exact number of manholes that would be replaced with the allocated funds will not be known without the City extensively investigating and subsequently receiving bids/quotes from third-party contractors. However, the City estimates that further investigation will detect between 4-5 manholes. This project would be far more time consuming than Plan A as well, so that it would be virtually impossible to meet the deadline requirements set by the Proposed Agreement.

Please note that for the reasons above, at this time the City will not be able to initiate the tasks associated with Plan B at this time. However, the City will do so voluntarily at some point in the future.

Conclusion

For the reasons set out above, the City proposes that it perform Plan A. The performance of that option will require the City to expend approximately \$13,000 in addition to the \$106,250 proposed penalty, and absent new information or unforeseen problems that could cause delays, the City will be able to complete the project within 130 days after the effective date of the proposed Agreed Order.

Many of the City of Bastrop's responses to provisions of the Respondent Compliance SEP Application are too lengthy to fit within the text boxes of the application. Therefore, below are responses to SEP application subject headings:

Nature of Violation/Problem:

Following an August 26, 2021 record review, TCEQ documented effluent violations of the City's Publicly owned Treatment Works ("POTW") TPDES Permit No. WQ0011076001 that had allegedly occurred during the months of April, May, and June 2021. Based on those alleged violations, TCEQ has assessed a civil administrative penalty in the amount of \$106,250. TCEQ has also offered the City the opportunity to enter into a Respondent Compliance SEP agreement where the City would fund one of two appropriate projects that relate directly (Plan A) or indirectly (Plan B) to the alleged violations.

Description of the Proposed SEP

The following provides outlines of the work and costs associated with the two different SEP proposals.

Plan A: POTW Upgrades: \$119,183.97

Plan A essentially consists of 3 equipment/parts purchases which are centered around operational capabilities of the wastewater system:

1. East Wastewater Treatment Facility ("WWTF") Blower: \$58,340.26- The existing Wastewater Treatment Facility consists of 2 separate wastewater treatment units. The larger of the 2 units was designed and built with only 2 blowers used for aeration/treatment processes. Due to catastrophic mechanical failure, only one blower is currently in operation for that treatment unit. The purchase of a second blower would prevent the discharge of untreated wastewater into the Colorado River, should the only existing blower fail.
2. Bypass pump repair: \$15,396.29- The City owns an aged sewer bypass pump which is currently inoperable due to extensive wear on the "wet end" of the pump. However, the City's estimate is that further investigation will detect between 4-5 additional manholes. This project would be far more time consuming than Plan A as well, so that it would be virtually impossible to meet the deadline requirements set by the Proposed Agreement.

#### Does the Proposed SEP Relate in any Way to the Violation?

Proposed Plan A SEP will improve the performance of the City's POTW: It would protect against the release of untreated effluent, and Plan B would eliminate inflow, infiltration, and exfiltration issues that could impact the POTW's performance in treating effluent discharges to the Colorado River.

The improved efficiency of the POTW Plans A and B would improve the overall performance of the POTW, and therefore will minimize instances of exceedances of the parameters set out in the facility's TPDES permit. Plan A will improve the efficiency of the POTW's ability to meet the terms of its permit and therefore directly relates to the alleged violations.

Under Plan B, the City will replace problematic manholes, and by so doing it will minimize inflow, infiltration, and exfiltration problems with the effluent before it reaches and affects the efficient operation of the POTW.

#### Expected Environmental Benefit

Pursuant to Plan A, the City's purchase of a second blower for the plant would prevent the discharge of untreated wastewater into the Colorado River, should the only existing blower fail. The repair of the one existing bypass pump and purchase of second pump would help eliminate potential upsets/discharges by ensuring that at least one pump was always functional.

Pursuant to Plan B, the City will identify and replace structurally unstable manholes within the City's wastewater collection system and would help to eliminate inflow, infiltration, and exfiltration problems. Therefore, Plan B would ensure the efficient operation of the POTW due to the reduction in pollutants in the City's sewer system.

The possession, manufacture, storage, sale, handling, and use of fireworks are prohibited within the City of Bastrop as per Section 5601.1.3 of the 2018 International Fire Code adopted by city ordinance as a protection to our community during dry times of low humidity.





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Dear Texans:


U.S. Census Bureau data indicate almost 2.8 million Texas households and 7 million people lack broadband access. Twenty three percent of Texans have limited ability to attend online classes, see a healthcare provider from their living room, fill out a job application online, start a business or access online marketplaces from their kitchen table. These barriers negatively affect Texans' quality of life and limit economic opportunities for people and the state overall.

According to a 2016 Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas report, this problem disproportionately affects rural communities, communities of color and low-income families. Since that report's publication, the COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated the adoption of technology for some but expanded the digital divide for others. The digital divide refers to the gap between those with broadband access and those without, whether caused by a lack of infrastructure, digital literacy, affordable service or access to devices.

In an effort to close this divide, the 87th Texas Legislature created the Broadband Development Office (BDO) at the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. The BDO is charged with broadband expansion, which includes establishing an official statewide plan for expanding access. The Legislature appropriated \$5 million to the Comptroller to administer the program. Additionally, the American Rescue Plan Act enacted by the federal government has allocated \$500.5 million to Texas for broadband expansion, while the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act will allocate at least \$100 million.

These combined state and federal dollars comprise a valuable resource, and our office is committed to using these funds as efficiently and effectively as possible. In March 2022, we launched the Texas Broadband Listening Tour, conducting regional town halls in 12 Texas communities so we could hear directly from Texans about their experiences with broadband. These stories, some of which appear in this report, are powerful and moving. Additionally, we issued an open invitation to all Texans to participate in a public broadband survey — available online, in print and via telephone in both English and Spanish. At the time of publication, more than 16,000 Texans have used our survey to share their broadband experiences.

Sentiment has been consistent: slow data speeds, unreliable access, affordability and coordination are critical areas of concern for Texas families, businesses, educators and



farmers. An important, recurring theme has been the reminder that though high-speed internet may once have been a luxury, it is now a necessity. Texans need reliable, high-speed connectivity for public health, safety, education and modern agriculture.

We compiled lessons learned from the Texas Broadband Listening Tour, survey responses, analysis of results and staff recommendations to create this initial [Texas Broadband Plan](#). We hope you find this plan useful, insightful and sound, as a road map for improvement. This is a monumental task, and we must work together to accomplish it. Expanding broadband access will require collaboration and partnerships between local governments and private entities, across counties and among residents.

## **Big City Mayors Request Special Session on Gun Reform**

The Big City Mayors, a bipartisan group of Texas' major cities, issued a [statement](#) on Tuesday calling for state leadership to take immediate action to prevent mass shootings in Texas. The mayors of Amarillo, Arlington, Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Grand Prairie, Houston, Laredo, Plano, San Antonio, and Sugar Land signed a letter asking Governor Abbott to call a special session centered on gun reform. The mayors specifically request action on the following items:

- Require universal background checks for gun purchases;
- Increase the age to purchase assault weapons in Texas to 21;
- Pass Red Flag laws to identify threats before shootings;
- Significant increase in mental health support funding; and
- Train and properly resource school safety officers

## **Comment Period for Proposed Civil Rules of Procedure for Municipal Courts**

The Supreme Court of Texas tasked the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center (TMCEC) and several city attorneys and municipal judges to participate in a workgroup to propose civil rules for application in municipal courts. The workgroup has created a survey to solicit feedback for the proposed rules prior to their submission to the Supreme Court Advisory Committee.

## **Texas Supreme Court Issues 52<sup>nd</sup> and 53<sup>rd</sup> Emergency Order of the COVID-19 Pandemic**

The Texas Supreme Court issued its 52<sup>nd</sup> and 53<sup>rd</sup> Emergency Orders renewing previous orders issued by the Court. The [52<sup>nd</sup> Emergency Order](#) continues to allow remote participation in court proceedings with limitations. The Order is set to be effective July 1 and expires September 1 unless extended by the Chief Justice.

The [53<sup>rd</sup> Emergency Order](#) renewed its 50<sup>th</sup> Emergency Order which pertains to the Texas Eviction Diversion Program. The Order, among other things, continues the closure of the program to new applicants.

## **Resolutions for 2022 Annual Conference**

Resolutions for consideration at the Annual Conference are due no later than 5:00 p.m. on **August 22, 2022**. The TML Constitution provides that resolutions must be submitted by any member city, TML region, or TML affiliate to the TML headquarters 45 calendar days prior to the first day of the Annual Conference.

The League's advocacy efforts are based on a legislative program that is developed by member city officials in two ways.

First, a member city, TML region, or TML affiliate may submit a resolution for consideration at the business meeting of each year's Annual Conference. Each city is asked to provide one delegate to serve as its liaison at the meeting. The representatives will be briefed on the content of the resolutions and given a chance to discuss and vote on whether they merit inclusion in the legislative program. The resolutions form the basis of a fixed legislative program, under which – each session – modifications to the program will be made only if needed.

Second, member city officials can participate in the League’s Municipal Policy Summit during the summer of 2022. The report of the Summit takes the form of a resolution that is submitted to the Annual Conference in interim years. The summit participants will be appointed by the TML President based on volunteers and others chosen to balance the demographics of the TML membership at large.

## **House and Senate Committee Interim Hearings**

The Texas House and Senate Committees are underway studying interim charges outlined by Speaker Phelan and Lt. Governor Dan Patrick.

Below is a full list of committee hearings set to hear certain city-related charges. All hearings will be held at the Texas Capitol unless otherwise indicated. If a committee has newly posted notice and was not included in last week’s edition of the *Legislative Update*, it is indicated as such.

### **Senate Health and Human Services Committee**

The committee will meet on June 27 at 10:00 a.m. to hear invited and public testimony on the following interim charge:

**Public Health Data:** Review the processes for public health data collection and coordination by local and state entities as well as regional trauma centers. Identify any continuing barriers to the real-time dissemination of data concerning health care facility capacity – including data that can expedite timely care – and morbidity rates, as well as other information that can assist in public policy decisions.

### **Senate Business and Commerce Committee**

The committee will meet on Wednesday, June 29 at 9:00 a.m. to hear invited and public testimony on the following interim charges:

**Broadband and Telecommunications:** Study broadband and other telecommunications related issues impacted Texans including:

- Monitoring the implementation of [House Bill 5](#) and [House Bill 1505](#), 87<sup>th</sup> Legislature; discuss anticipated federal infrastructure funding dedicated to broadband initiatives;
- Reviewing the Texas Universal Service Fund and reporting what, if any, changes should be made through a review of both the fund’s contributions and

disbursements, as well as the impact of technology on the long-term stability of the Texas Universal Service Fund; and

- Monitoring the implementation of [House Bill 2911](#), 87<sup>th</sup> Legislature, relating to next generation 9-1-1 service fund and the establishment of a next generation 9-1-1 service fund.

**Electricity:** Study issues impacting the Texas electric grid, including weather preparedness and the natural gas supply chain. Evaluate potential benefits of real-time transparency of the intrastate gas market with respect to the functions of ERCOT and the Texas Energy Reliability Council.

### **Senate Finance Committee**

The committee will meet on Monday, July 11 at 10:00 a.m. to hear invited and public testimony on the following interim charges:

**Federal Funds:** Report on the state use of federal COVID-19 relief funds provided under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, the American Rescue Plan Act, Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Acts, and similar federal legislation. Examine local use of federal relief funding, including funding provided to school districts through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. Evaluate the overall fiscal impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on state agencies, including costs incurred due to federal mandates. Identify barriers to the effective utilization of funds and make recommendations on the expenditure of unappropriated funds. In addition, evaluate and report on the spending by state agencies that have been utilizing "one-time" federal funding (temporary enhancements, e.g. FMAP and ESSER) sources, where federal funding will likely be significantly reduced in future biennia.
